'For on to us a child is born' Isaiah 9:6

I absolutely love Advent, I love the growing excitement that builds to Christmas. I also love the Christmas Masses. Fach of the four Masses for Christmas (the vigil Mass on Christmas Eve. Midnight Mass. Mass at dawn and Mass during the day), have different readings. It is the only time in the year when the readings are different despite the Mass being for the same celebration and unlike other feasts it is not down to the year rotation of readings. The quote at the beginning of this reflection is taken from the first reading of Midnight Mass which prophesises the birth of the saviour. This year this quote has a completely new meaning for my wife and I. as last month we were blessed with the birth of our first child, Esther Rose Hopkins. She is a beautiful, life-changing gift. Her birth has transformed our daily (and mainly nightly) lives. I hope I never forget that moment she burst into the world, the moment our world was changed. We were entrusted with the care of this vulnerable and precious little lady. Christmas is the celebration of a birth, of a change of the world and lives; and this was not just for Mary and Joseph, this is for

all of us. Christmas is not the celebration of a new life for a little family in the middle east. It is so much more. God the Son is the fullness of life. He is the Word of God and it is through Him that all things came into being. When he took human flesh and a human soul, in the person of Jesus fully human and fully divine: a new life was not just given to a married couple, but to all of humanity. In the person of Jesus, the power of God encounters the fragility of humanity. Since Esther's birth I've

experienced a deepening of love,

for her and for my wife. It has helped me further know God's love for me, but above all to love like a Father. The love that will do everything and anything to protect others. No matter how much we love, we can't run out of love, it isn't a finite resource to be treated with temperance. The more we love, the deeper we love, the more we are able to love.

Christmas is a call, a call that requires a response. For on to us a child is born. For on to us is given the opportunity to love and be loved beyond our imagination. We celebrate this day as a sign that God loves us so much. He

comes to live among us (to pitch His tent amongst us for literally a translation of the Gospel from the Mass during the day). He comes not in power, or glory, or by the power of a sword. He comes in the most natural, simple and ordinary way; as a baby that is dependant, that is in need. Why? Because humanity is in need. I never knew how much I was in need of Esther until she was born, already I feel the change she has brought to me, to be less selfish, more loving, more kind and patient. She has changed me. The baby Jesus has the power to change us even more.

I invite you as we prepare for/ celebrate Christmas (depending when you read this) to spend some time looking at a picture or statue of the crib. Please know this: you need Him and He needs you. You need Him to fill your heart and your life with love, with more love, with a love that shakes your way of living. He needs you to firstly be like Him – to be vulnerable and helpless before Him, as He is before you, so that you can bring the love that He is offering the world into flesh. The incarnation, God becoming present in the flesh, is the heart of everything we do and believe as a Church. It is also the core of who we are meant to be. Love in action.

For on to us a child is born... for on to us love has a face... for on to others we are born... for onto others love must be our face.

FIND YOUR MARIGOLD

A member of staff at Blessed Robert Sutton CVA recently shared the concept of being a Marigold at the school's half-termly Teaching and Learning Community meeting.

If you are not familiar with the concept as many people weren't here at Blessed Robert Sutton this should explain it a little. Find your Marigold: The one essential rule for any teacher....

THE MARIGOLD EFFECT

Many experienced gardeners follow a concept called companion planting: placing certain vegetables and plants near each other to improve growth for one or both plants. For example, rose growers plant garlic near their roses because it repels bugs and prevents fungal diseases.

Among companion plants, the marigold is one of the best: It protects a wide variety of plants from pests and harmful weeds. If you plant a marigold beside most any garden vegetable, that vegetable will grow big and strong and healthy, protected and encouraged by its marigold.

Personal

I am 37 years old and have always lived locally; I was born and raised in Nottinghamshire. work in Leicestershire and live in Derbyshire. I left the Midlands briefly - studying History in Hull and, after a year as a Teaching Assistant, completing my PGCE in Oxford. I have worked in the Primary sector as a teacher in Catholic Schools since 2006. In that time, I have taught across ages and phases, led many subjects and completed the National Award for Special Educational Needs. I have also led on Pupil Premium and work as a Senior Leader of Education with a focus on data and assessment. Catholic Schools have played a very important role in my life; raised as an Anglican, I was received as a full member of the Catholic Church in 2014. Where are you based? I work in Loughborough. Leicestershire and live in Melbourne, Derbyshire. What is your vision for the St Ralph Sherwin CMAT and the children within it?

As you will have already read from other members of the Executive Team and Board, we see our role as securing Catholic education in our area of the Diocese of Nottingham for the children of today and tomorrow. We want to ensure the pupils in our schools are experiencing the very best education and spiritual development that we can possibly provide. This means that we also need to ensure that the staff (by which I mean everyone employed in the schools across the Trust not just the teachers) are provided with professional development that enables them to become their best as well as recognise their dedication, talents and achievements. We are also working with Local Governing Bodies to ensure that they, who give their time so generously, can fulfil their duties effectively. By providing these things (and many more), it is our hope that the St Ralph Sherwin CMAT becomes renowned for the positive work it does with all members of the local communities and the joy with which it does it. Like I did, I hope that by interacting with the CMAT, as a pupil, parent, governor, member of staff or visitor, people can begin

with Christ.

Tell us about your role day to day.

I was elected as the Vice Chair of the St Ralph Sherwin Catholic Multi Academy Trust in September. Within the Trust, I chair the Curriculum and Standards Committee and am the lead Foundation Director for SFND.

As volunteers, our job is to ensure that the Trust is working towards delivering our vision underpinned by the Strategic Plan. This sees us doing a variety of different things at different times from attending meetings, training, reading papers and policies, to attending Local Governing Body Meetings across the Trust's locations. With the Executive Team, our role is to provide challenge and support asking questions as appropriate and reassuring when needed, keeping minds on the strategic plan and ensuring our mission is firmly at the heart of what we are trying to achieve. There are also legal requirements we have to fulfil such as signing off financial returns.

The first time we ever met as a board was on a Strategy Day. organised by Jacqueline, before the CMAT officially existed. We now do this annually to reflect on how we feel we are progressing towards meeting our vision. So far, it has been an exciting time to be part of the journey of the Trust and I feel fortunate to have met people who are inspired to do great work for Catholic education; I feel privileged to be part of the story of St Ralph Sherwin CMAT.

As part of our theme on Encounter and 'Homelessness'. the senior chaplaincy team visited the Well Centre to hand over all our food donations.

The Well Spring representative informed the children that the food we donated would feed the people they saw for a week. The children reflected on their visit and have written some of their thoughts on our liturgical wheel. 
COMMITMENT TO CPD

Last month saw Andrew Monaghan, HT at St Alban's, our CFO Sean and Chair of the Trust Jacqueline embark on a one-year programme with the National School of Formation, designed specifically for leaders in Catholic education.

The opening days of the programme, called the Immersion Event, had one impressive speaker after another including Fr Denis McBride (Director of Redemptorist Press), Dr John McDade (former Principal of Heythrop College) and Louise Carter (Formation Director for L' Arche UK), each sharing their knowledge and experience as well as posing thought provoking questions to the group. The programme will include further sessions with the whole cohort together as well as study visits (each delegate chooses those of most relevance to them) to a wide range of places where work is done to help those who are homeless; people escaping violent relationships; people caught up in a world of knife crime and many others.

SKYDIVE RAISES OVER £3,000 FOR CHARITIES

The Chief Executive Officer and Chair of St Ralph Sherwin Catholic Multi Academy Trust raised more than £3,000 for charity by jumping 13,500ft from a plane.

CEO Sean McClafferty raised £1,508, including Gift Aid, for Rainbows Hospice for Children and Young People, one of the Trust's nominated charities, beating his target of £1,000.

Trust Chair Jacqueline Rodden also surpassed her £1,000 target and raised £1,413, including Gift Aid, for Bluebell Wood Children's Hospice, another

programme.

- "I know of colleagues who have been in earlier cohorts and found the whole experience to be very beneficial in helping their formation as Catholic leaders," said Sean McClafferty.
- Having spent the majority of her career in learning and change within large organisations, Jacqueline observed that. "It is interesting to see both the similarities and differences in the types of conversations between delegates compared to those in the corporate world.
- "Another benefit is meeting executive leaders, as well as those volunteering in governance roles in other MATs, sharing what we have learnt in our Trust as well as hearing from them about their experiences." The style of the programme with presentations, discussions and time for personal reflection works well and according to Andrew. "Having time away from the busyness of school life has allowed me time to reflect on my own practice of leadership, which is a rare opportunity that I made the most of."

Both Sean and Jacqueline completed their jumps at Langar Airfield, near Nottingham, and were delighted with the amounts raised which put them in the top 5% of 50,000 JustGiving pages. Sean said: "It was terrifying. However, knowing that so much money had been raised for two such worthy causes gave me the courage to jump out of that plane!"

'GOOD' OFSTED **RATINGS FOR TWO TRUST SCHOOLS**

Two schools in the St Ralph Sherwin Catholic Multi Academy Trust are celebrating after being rated 'Good' in all areas by Ofsted.

Inspectors visited St Edward's Catholic Voluntary Academy, in Swadlincote, and St Joseph's Catholic Voluntary Academy, in Matlock, for two days in September 2019.

They assessed areas including: the quality of education; behaviour and attitudes; personal development; leadership and management and early schools. They both thoroughly deserve this years provision. Prior to becoming academies, both schools were graded by Ofsted as being in 'special measures'

Inspectors said that leaders and staff at St Edward's shared the same high aspirations for all pupils to do well and that pupils enjoyed coming to the school At St Joseph's Matlock, inspectors praised the "warm, welcoming and caring atmosphere throughout the school."

Lead inspector Christine Watkins wrote: "The staff encourage all pupils to aim high and do their best, both in lessons and in their personal development.



Pupils do well in English and mathematics and support is readily available to those who need it." Sean McClafferty, chief executive of the St Ralph Sherwin CMAT, congratulated both schools. He said: "We are so proud of everyone at both fantastic grade in recognition of the hard work and dedication from staff, pupils and governors." Charles States
